Lucky Devil !

The best part about appearing as a contestant on "The Price Is Right" isn't winning a new car or spinning the big wheel. The best part is meeting Bob Barker.

Shaking hands with the veteran host was undoubtedly the highlight of my recent experience as a contestant on the long-running CBS game show. Sure, I walked away with some cash and prizes, which was great, but **when you're as big a game show fan as I am, meeting Bob Barker is akin to meeting the president.**

The whole thing started back in October when Barker announced that he would be retiring after his 35th season as host of "The Price Is Right." **I didn't want to miss the chance to see him in person, so I immediately booked a flight to Los Angeles, reserved a room at a hotel across the street from CBS Television City, and planned my strategy for getting onto the show.**

Mind you, this wouldn't be my first time on a game show. In 2003, I won \$32,000 as a contestant on the syndicated version of "Who Wants to Be a Millionaire." **But let's face it, "The Price Is Right" is an American institution. Getting called to "come on down" would be the ultimate accomplishment in my short game show career.**

First, though, there was the matter of actually getting into the studio. The show tapes four days a week, and to ensure yourself a spot in the audience, you need to

obtain a ticket beforehand and line up hours and hours before the taping time. They distribute far more tickets than the studio actually holds to ensure they have a full house for every taping. And in order to be chosen as a contestant, you have to become an audience member first.

So my brother-in-law and I got into line at 1:15 a.m. **for a 2:30 p.m. show...yes, a full 13 hours before the taping was scheduled to begin.** Even then we were only the 68th and 69th **people in line.** The "Price Is Right" audience experience is long and grueling with a lot of waiting, so you spend a good deal of time meeting and talking to other people in line. They come from all over the U.S., and most of them wear some sort of customized "Price Is Right" t-shirt (I had one made with a picture of my five kids on the front holding a sign that read, "Daddy needs a new car!")

You have to jump through a variety of hoops once the CBS Television City gates open at 6 a.m., including an **interview with a contestant coordinator.** **That's where they pick the nine people (out of 325 in the studio) who will be selected as contestants.** My interview was short – only about 30 seconds – and I had no idea whether I was going to be picked.

Once you get seated in the Bob Barker Studio, you notice right away that it's much smaller than it looks on TV, and they keep it extremely cold. "Price Is Right" announcer Rich Fields comes out on stage to warm up the audience, and then before you know it, the stage manager is urging the crowd to clap and cheer as the taping begins.

I was one of the first four people called down to **Contestant's Row.** **I almost tripped working my way to the center aisle, and when I got to the bottom I hugged the contestants who were already there.** (We were all pretty excited.) The first item up for bids was a set of four electric guitars. I had been watching the show for weeks beforehand and taking notes on the prices of various items – **yes, I'm that obsessed** – so I was pretty confident my bid of \$2,100 was a good one.

I was right. When Bob read off the actual retail price of **\$2,147, he pointed at me and said, "Scott, you are the winner!"** I came up on stage and shook his hand, telling him what an honor it was to meet him after years of watching the show on television. The pricing game I was to play was called "Flip Flop." The object of the game is to identify the price of a prize – in my case it was a sauna – by rotating two squares with numbers on them.

The first square had the number "25" on it, and I decided to flip it so that it read "52." After consulting with the audience, I left the second square at "45," making my guess \$5,245. The sauna's actual price was \$5,254. So close!

Later I got to spin the big wheel against two other contestants. My score of 85 cents was just enough to beat a woman from Hawaii whom I had met in line, which meant I would go on to the Showcase Showdown at the end of the show. At that point, you can be sure my head was spinning.

In the Showcase Showdown I was up against John, a nice kid from New Orleans who had won the second half of the show. When John bid \$38,000 on his showcase, everyone in the studio – including me – thought he had overbid. So, I figured all I had to do was bid way low on my own showcase and I would win.

My showcase consisted of a dinette set, Noritake dinnerware service for 12, and a new Dodge Magnum. I figured the actual price would be somewhere around \$26,000, but I stuck to my strategy and put in a low bid of \$20,100. As it turned out, though, John was a mere \$1,700 under the price of his showcase, while I was a whopping \$9,895 off of mine. That meant that **John won and I lost, but I honestly didn't care.** The experience was something that would stick with me for the rest of my life.

My show taped on Jan. 8 and aired Feb. 16. Less than a week after the air date, I received a call from someone at CBS telling me that Bob had made a mistake when he explained the Flip-Flop game rules to me – **even though I certainly didn't realize it at the time** -- and that several viewers had called in to complain about it. To make things right, CBS offered to send me the sauna or a check equivalent to their cost for the sauna (\$2,545). I took the check and used the funds to cover the cost of a trip to Las Vegas with my wife, Terry, and me, and to buy a new laptop.

It was a strange ending to what was a strange – but hugely satisfying – experience!

Organ / Tissue Donation

Each day, about 77 people get the organ transplant that gives them a second chance, but 19 others die waiting for a donated organ. According to the U.S. Surgeon General website, as of April 3, 2007 at 8:12pm, there were 95,806 people on the waiting list for organ donations; 74% (70,869) of which were waiting for kidneys.

In 2006, nearly 29,000 transplants were performed from a pool of nearly 15,000 donors; 23.2% (6,732) of which were from living donors.

Organs that can currently be transplanted include kidneys, heart, lungs, liver, pancreas, and the intestines. Most donated organs are from people who have died, but a living individual can donate a kidney, part of the pancreas, part of a lung, part of the liver, or part of the intestine.

Heart

- Each year, about 2,000 heart transplants are performed.
- In 2003, around 3,500 people were on the waiting list for a heart transplant and over 450 people died while on the waiting list

Lung

- About 1,000 patients receive a lung transplant each year.
- Each year, about 4,000 people are waiting for a lung transplant and over 400 people die each year while on the waiting list.

Intestine

- Around 100 intestine transplants were performed in 2003.
- In 2003, over 150 patients were on the waiting list for an intestine transplant and about 40 people died while on the waiting list.
- The majority of intestinal transplants are performed in infants and children.

Liver

- Around 5,000 people receive liver transplants each year.
- Each year, over 17,000 people are waiting to receive a liver transplant and about 2,000 people die while on the waiting list
- A donated liver can be split between two recipients, so that one deceased donor can be the source of two liver transplants.

Kidney

- About 14,000 kidney transplants are performed each year. Just over one third of transplanted

kidneys are from living donors.

- At any point, about 55,000 people are on the waiting list for a kidney transplant and each year, over 3,000 people die while on the waiting list

Pancreas

- In 2003, over 450 people received a pancreas transplant.
- In 2003, about 1,500 people were on the waiting list for a pancreas and about 30 people died while on the waiting list

Transplantable tissues include corneas, the middle ear, skin, heart valves, bone, veins, cartilage, tendons, and ligaments. Tissues can be stored in tissue banks and used to restore sight, cover burns, repair hearts, replace veins, and mend damaged connective tissue and cartilage in recipients.

Stem cells

Healthy adults between the ages of 18-60 can donate blood stem cells to individuals with closely matched tissue types. Since tissue types are inherited, patients are more likely to find a matched donor within their own racial and ethnic group. There are three sources of blood stem cells that healthy volunteers can donate; Marrow (the soft tissue found in the interior cavities of bones), Peripheral blood stem cells (stem cells circulating in the blood), and Cord blood stem cells (the umbilical cord that connects a newborn to the mother during pregnancy contains blood which contains high levels of blood stem cells).

Blood

You can donate blood every 56 days and platelets twice in one week up to 24 times a year. While the testing and screening process associated with blood donation may take up to one hour, the actual blood donation process takes only about 10 minutes to collect a unit (one pint) of blood. Platelets are tiny cell fragments that circulate throughout the blood and aid in blood clotting. Platelets can be donated without actually donating blood as platelets are separated from the rest of the blood which is then returned to the donor. The donor's body will replace the missing platelets within a few hours.

Who can donate organs / tissues?

All people of all ages should consider themselves potential organ and tissue donors. While there are few absolute exclusions (HIV positive, active cancer, systemic infection) and no strict upper or lower age limits (both newborns and senior citizens have been organ donors),

potential donors will be evaluated for suitability when the occasion arises. Prior to transplantation, doctors examine the organs to determine whether they are suitable for donation. Most religions support organ and tissue donation as a charitable act of love and giving. Giving the "Gift of Life" may lighten the grief of the donor's own family; many donor families say that knowing other lives have been saved helps them cope with their tragic loss.

What can you do?

1. Register with your state donor registry, if available.
2. **Designate your decision on your driver's license.**
3. Sign a [donor card](#) and carry it with you. Cards are available at no cost at the [HRSA Information Center](#) (<http://ask.hrsa.gov>)
4. Talk to your family to help them understand and carry out your wishes. They can serve as your advocate and may be asked to give consent for donation or provide information to the transplant team.
5. Visit www.OrganDonor.gov or www.surgeongeneral.gov for more details on organ and tissue donation (both sources used as data references in this article).
